


Over the year, our programmes reached





Inspired Directions School



Our school, which caters for vulnerable young people with a range of additional support needs, delivers a flexible curriculum with an emphasis on project-based learning. This year, our projects covered areas including:



Film: our students produced their own documentary films in partnership with 'The Mouth that Roars'. Their films explored issues that affect young people

Catering: with the help of The Shoreditch Trust, the students have been learning to cook healthy meals, putting their skills into practice by cooking for local residents at SimpleGifts Unitarian Centre



term gardening and enterprise project with partners OrganicLea, growing and selling their own organic vegetables

Music: our music programme went from strength to strength, with many of our students writing and recording their own lyrics on a huge range of issues, as well as composing original backing tracks

our long-term partnership with Circle Housing continued, giving students the opportunity to learn valuable skills and channel their energy into creativity

Construction:



Nathan* had had only negative experiences in mainstream education; he had severe speech and language difficulties and low confidence and achievement because of this. Struggling to keep up with his peers, this resulted in frequent truancy and a lack of engagement in class.

When he first came to Inspired Directions, Nathan remembers feeling anxious about the new experience. However, with support from our dedicated team of staff, he soon found new interests and talent in expressing himself creatively.

Music lessons within the school gave him the opportunity to present his own segment on radio and record his own hip-hop song; drama workshops helped boost his confidence, leading to a role in a West End play.

Obstacles to his academic progress were overcome through one-on-one support, and he was able to gain IGCSEs in Maths and English and Functional Skills in Maths, English and ICT. He was able to present himself confidently at his college interview, something he says he never would have been able to do before, and gained a place to study construction.

His time with us also inspired increased interest in academic study, and he intends to study science in the next academic year. With a significant amount progress made in a short space of time, Nathan describes his time here as "fun, independent and exciting."

Why do we do it?

Despite recent development in Hackney and surrounding boroughs, the world of opportunities here and in the nearby City may seem out of reach for many local young people.

With 33% of school pupils in Hackney eligible for free school meals in 2016¹, child poverty remains high, giving rise to associated problems of worklessness, generational unemployment and a lack of role models. One in five young Londoners are unemployed², and many young people leave school without adequate preparation for the working world.

Meet the volunteer

"As a Sustainability Officer, my job involves finding ways for the business to contribute to the local community. We're trying to move away from seeing social value as a box ticking exercise at Laing O' Rourke, and really focus on leaving a positive legacy: this includes inspiring and creating opportunities for the next generation.

"I heard about Inspire! from a colleague and thought it would be a great way to engage our workforce in volunteering. It takes just a morning or an afternoon so it's easy to commit to."

I've taken part in three programmes, a Careers Carousel and two 'You're Hired!' programmes at BSix college. The Careers Carousel was great, the young people loved it because there were such a variety of employers in the room, they were asking all sorts of questions. You can make a lot of impact in a short space of time as well. For example one of the students told me they were interested in engineering, but didn't fully understand what it meant, I was able to show them that's there's a huge range of careers in the construction industry. It benefited me as well: I learnt to adapt the language I used to the age group, making sure that they understood and were engaged.

"Practical, employer-led opportunities like this were really lacking when I was at school. I think young people take more on board when they're hearing about real experiences from the people sat in front of them."

Meet the employer



We put the spotlight on one employer, D&D London, who run a group of luxury restaurants, bars and hotels in London and internationally. D&D employees have made a fantastic contribution to our programmes. Here are some of the ways they've been inspiring young people over the past year:

Sharing their career stories at secondary schools

Employees from D&D took some time away from the kitchen to speak to secondary school students about what it takes to work in hospitality.

The volunteers joined Inspire! at William Ellis School to take part in a Careers Carousel, a 'speed networking' event where small groups of students meet a wide range of business volunteers in rotation. The events help young people to gain confidence in talking to professionals, broaden their awareness and knowledge of available careers and raise their aspirations for the future.

Nurturing future talent through work experience

By offering **65** work experience placements across 13 restaurants to local students this year, D&D have enabled young people to experience the reality of working in hospitality and gain valuable life skills along the way.

Investing in young people has seen positive results for the business as well as the students, with a former work experience student returning to take on an apprenticeship in 2016.

"It's an opportunity to see potential young chefs coming through the ranks – even at 14 and 15 years old there are some real little superstars."

After making their own menus and crafting some delicious treats and mocktails, pupils learnt the importance of customer service by roleplaying the different jobs in a restaurant.
